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FROM DATA TO ACTION: A REVIEW OF ALL 2018 INFANT DEATHS IN NORTHEAST FLORIDA

Since 1995, the Coalition has implemented a Fetal & Infant Mortality Review project to reduce infant mortality by gathering and reviewing detailed information to gain a better understanding of fetal and infant deaths. The project examines cases with the worst outcomes to identify gaps in maternal and infant services and to promote future improvements. Last October, Baptist Health/Wolfson Children's Hospital, UF Health Jacksonville and Florida Blue announced funding for a full review of why babies are dying before their first birthday in Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns counties.

All 147 infant deaths from 2018 were reviewed. The detailed analysis included abstraction of medical and vital statistics records for all infant deaths; analysis of fetal and infant deaths (overall and by race) using the Perinatal Periods of Risk to create a population-based framework and identify disparities in birth outcomes; and integration of information abstracted from patient records into PPOR analysis to determine the impact of specific medical and social risks, gaps and opportunities for intervention. The review utilized Doctor of Nursing Practice students from Jacksonville University to assist with data abstraction and maternal interviews.
