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
### What is Infant Mortality?

Per 1,000 Live Births







"Through comprehensive multidisciplinary review of fetal and infant deaths, **identify** significant health, social, economic, safety, and other **issues** that may have impacted the poor birth outcome".

"a community-based and action-oriented process to improve service systems and resources for women, infants, and families"



**65%** of those with a known pregnancy intention were unplanned

Of those, 38% used substances during that pregnancy and

12% have experienced IPV

**22%** 3<sup>rd</sup> trimester or no prenatal care

**44%** Birth spacing < 18 months

**48%** Had stressors during pregnancy

**30%** Substance use during pregnancy

**49%** had at least ONE chronic condition

**14%** had more than one chronic condition

#### Those with hypertension

71% were obese

**54%** developed pre-eclampsia

**32%** 3<sup>rd</sup> trimester entry or no prenatal care



### Sleep Related Deaths Reviewed 2019-2023 (n-31)

#### **SLEEP SURFACE**





Did not have stable housing at the time of the infant's death

#### **ENVIRONMENT**

**39%** Overcrowded living situation

29% Had at least 3 other children

16% No safe sleep surface for infant

**ALL** but 1 infant who was on a safe sleep surface had objects in their sleep environment

#### **HAZARDS**


84% Sleeping on an unsafe surface

**94%** Objects in the bed, including adults, blankets and pillows

**35%** Infant not placed on their back


### Fetal Deaths by Race (per 1,000 deliveries)

27% High blood pressure


32% Obese BMI



### **Decrease sleep-related infant deaths**

in Northeast Florida by 10%



- Increase awareness of the causes of sleep-related deaths by the dissemination of educational materials and training to hotel/motel personnel, daycare staff, homeless shelters, churches, and nontraditional agencies to reach target audience.
- Encourage fathers to engage in safe sleep and infant safety education programs.

#### Improve the health of women of childbearing age

through the creation of medical home models that address social determinants of health, toxic stress, health and nutrition



- Address women's health through the life course (before, during and after pregnancy)
- Increase the awareness of the value of home visitation to parents, families and community members as a prevention strategy to reduce poor birth outcomes, promote infant/child health, and foster child development.

## Integrate at least three policies into local government to address social determinants of health that affect Black infant mortality.



 Collaborate with the Department of Justice to implement a transition plan from their health system to Medicaid for pregnant women.
